* Proper use of earnings forecasts, and other special matters

Reason for not disclosing dividend forecast, etc.

We have adopted a basic policy of approximately maintaining a 50 percent dividend payout ratio by taking into account payout consistency, net asset position, and other managerial judgments based on our corporate philosophy of striving to act in the best interest of our shareholders.

As described in “3. Forecast of non-consolidated financial results for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2026 (from April 1, 2025 to March 31, 2026),” we have yet to determine the year-end dividend forecast for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2026 due to difficulty in forecasting earnings. However, for the five fiscal years under the Seventh Medium-term Management Plan (from the fiscal year ending March 2026 to the fiscal year ending March 2030), the Company has set the minimum annual dividend per share at ¥30.00, as part of our continued efforts on enhancing shareholder returns. We will promptly disclose the forecast amount at the timing when the second quarter-end and the fiscal year-end approach (during September 2025 and March 2026).

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1. Overview of operating results, etc.

(1) Quarterly overview of operating results

During the first nine months ended December 31, 2025 (hereinafter the “period under review”), the Japanese economy generally remained firm, supported by an ongoing improvement in business sentiment. Although Japan’s gross domestic product (GDP) fell into negative year-on-year growth in both nominal and real terms for the first time in six quarters in the July-September 2025 quarter, the leading composite index (CI) and the coincident CI turned positive after hitting the bottom in April and in August, respectively. In October, the Economy Watchers Survey DIs for future economic conditions surpassed 50—the break-even point between improvement and deterioration in business conditions, while the major index, including the Consumer Confidence Index of the Consumer Confidence Survey, started to recover after bottoming out in April. As uncertainty surrounding U.S. tariff policies eased and corporations continued to proactively increase wages amid rising prices, the Bank of Japan decided on an additional rate hike in December 2025, increasing the prospect of a moderate recovery in the domestic economy.

The U.S. economy remained firm, with real GDP growth recovering to its highest level in two years in the July-September 2025 quarter. During the period under review, the failure to pass a federal government stopgap funding bill resulted in a partial government shutdown that lasted 43 days from October 1 to mid-November—the longest in history—raising concerns about its potential impact on economic activity. Despite the uncertain environment in which the release of key economic statistics was delayed or canceled, the Federal Reserve Board (FRB) implemented its third consecutive interest rate cut through its December meeting, reflecting the slowdown in the employment environment.

During the period under review, the domestic stock market made a turbulent start, with the Nikkei average recording its third-largest decline in history and reaching its lowest level in approximately one year and five months following the announcement of reciprocal tariffs by the U. S. at the beginning of the period. However, the market subsequently benefited from the partial suspension of reciprocal tariffs, agreements reached in tariff negotiations between Japan-U.S. and between U.S.-China. The market was also buoyed by a surge in semiconductor-related stocks driven by growing demand for generative AI, solid earnings from domestic corporations, and a global stock rally fueled by positive sentiment towards U.S. monetary easing. In addition, buying prevailed due to expectations for the new administration's policies following Takaichi's victory in the LDP presidential election, and the Nikkei average reached a record high of ¥52,411.34 at the end of October. Although the market underwent some corrections from November onwards due to concerns about overheating and tensions in Japan-China relations, the Nikkei average for the period under review ended at ¥50,339.48, up 41.3% from the end of March 2025.

Under these circumstances, we reported increases in both operating revenue and net operating revenue during the period under review, with operating revenue of ¥11,733 million (up 8.4% year-on-year) and net operating revenue of ¥11,673 million (up 8.2% year-on-year), which is the amount of operating revenue less financial expenses of ¥60 million (up 54.8% year-on-year). Selling, general and administrative expenses were ¥9,431 million (up 3.5% year-on-year). As a result, we reported operating profit of ¥2,242 million (up 33.9% year-on-year) and ordinary profit of ¥2,659 million (up 26.4% year-on-year). After extraordinary income of ¥668 million (compared to ¥30 million for the same period a year earlier) and tax expenses of ¥1,047 million (up 104.6% year-on-year), profit was ¥2,280 million (up 40.4% year-on-year).

The following is an overview of the Company’s operating results.

(i) Commission received

For the period under review, total “Commission received” was ¥8,944 million (down 8.6% year-on-year).

(a) Brokerage commission

“Brokerage commission” was ¥3,482 million (down 11.5% year-on-year). This was mainly due to brokerage commissions for Japanese stocks decreasing to ¥2,184 million (down 2.6% year-on-year), and those for U.S. stocks decreasing to ¥1,276 million (down 23.2% year-on-year), resulting in the brokerage commission on stocks amounting to ¥3,460 million (down 11.4% year-on-year). Meanwhile, the brokerage commission for beneficiary certificates was ¥21 million (down 21.6% year-on-year).

(b) Commission for underwriting, secondary distribution and solicitation for selling and others for professional investors

“Commission for underwriting, secondary distribution and solicitation for selling and others for professional investors” was ¥81 million (up 47.1% year-on-year).

- (c) Fees for offering, secondary distribution and solicitation for selling and others for professional investors “Fees for offering, secondary distribution and solicitation for selling and others for professional investors” which mainly consists of investment trust sales commissions, was ¥1,137 million (down 42.7% year-on-year).
 - (d) Other fees received
“Other fees received” was ¥4,243 million (up 11.3% year-on-year) mainly due to increases in agency commission for investment trusts and wrap fees.
- (ii) Net trading income
For the period under review, “Net trading income” was ¥2,469 million (up 223.3% year-on-year), including ¥2,387 million in stocks (up 266.5% year-on-year) due to an increase in the trading volume of U.S. stocks and ¥81 million in bonds and foreign exchange (down 27.2% year-on-year).
 - (iii) Financial revenue and expenses
For the period under review, “Financial revenue” was ¥300 million (up 19.3% year-on-year), mainly due to an increase in interest income, and “Financial expenses” was ¥60 million (up 54.8% year-on-year) mainly due to increases in interest payments and cost of margin transactions, resulting in a net profit of ¥240 million (up 12.8% year-on-year).
 - (iv) Selling, general and administrative expenses
For the period under review, “Selling, general and administrative expenses” was ¥9,431 million (up 3.5% year-on-year). This was mainly attributable to increases in “Personnel expenses” (including provision for bonuses) and “Real estate expenses” resulting from an increase in operating revenue, which were partially offset by a decrease of “Trading related expenses.”
 - (v) Extraordinary income and losses
For the period under review, “Extraordinary income” was ¥668 million (compared to ¥30 million for the same period a year earlier), consisting of “Gain on sale of investment securities” of ¥668 million and “Reversal of reserve for financial instruments transaction liabilities” of ¥0 million.

(2) Quarterly overview of financial position

- (i) Current assets
At the end of the period under review, “Current assets” amounted to ¥60,344 million, an increase of ¥13,844 million from the end of the previous fiscal year. This was mainly attributable to increases of ¥11,581 million in “Cash and deposits,” ¥2,042 million in “Cash segregated as deposits,” ¥172 million in “Margin transaction assets,” and ¥147 million in “Trading products,” which were partially offset by decreases of ¥179 million in “Advances paid” and ¥100 million in “Cash paid for offering.”
- (ii) Non-current assets
At the end of the period under review, “Non-current assets” amounted to ¥18,804 million, an increase of ¥1,823 million from the end of the previous fiscal year. This was mainly attributable to increases of ¥1,642 million in “Investment securities,” ¥92 million in “Intangible assets,” and ¥91 million in “Property, plant and equipment.”
- (iii) Current liabilities
At the end of the period under review, “Current liabilities” amounted to ¥33,333 million, an increase of ¥13,970 million from the end of the previous fiscal year. This was mainly attributable to increases of ¥14,320 million in “Deposits received” and ¥299 million in “Margin transaction liabilities,” which were partially offset by decreases of ¥521 million in “Provision for share awards for employees” (due to the distribution of shares to employees) and ¥245 million in “Borrowings secured by securities.”
- (iv) Non-current liabilities and reserves under special laws
At the end of the period under review, “Non-current liabilities” and “Reserves under special laws” collectively amounted to ¥4,705 million, an increase of ¥684 million from the end of the previous fiscal year. This was mainly attributable to increases of ¥708 million in “Deferred tax liabilities” and ¥81 million in “Provision for share awards for employees,” which were partially offset by a decrease of ¥123 million in “Provision for retirement benefits.”

(v) Net assets

At the end of the period under review, “Net assets” amounted to ¥41,110 million, an increase of ¥1,013 million from the end of the previous fiscal year. This was mainly attributable to increases of ¥2,280 million in “Profit,” ¥1,216 million in “Valuation difference on available-for-sale securities,” and ¥468 million in “Disposal of treasury shares,” which were partially offset by decreases of ¥1,851 million in “Dividends of surplus” and ¥1,101 million in “Purchase of treasury shares.”

(3) Outlook

We are engaged in the financial instruments business, and thus, its earnings could fluctuate greatly depending on the stock market performance and other factors. We therefore do not disclose earnings forecasts.

(3) Notes to quarterly non-consolidated financial statements

The quarterly non-consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Article 4, Paragraph 1 of Standards for Preparation of Quarterly Financial Statements of the Tokyo Stock Exchange, Inc. and accounting principles generally accepted in Japan for quarterly financial statements, applying the provisions for reduced disclosures as set forth in Article 4, Paragraph 2 of the Standards.

Segment information, etc.

The Company does not provide segment information because it has only a single business segment, which is the investment and financial services business.

Significant changes in shareholders' equity

Based on the resolution at the Board of Directors' meeting held on April 28, 2025, we acquired 2,000,000 shares of treasury shares, and based on the resolution at the Board of Directors' meeting held on May 19, 2025, the entire amount of the general reserve was withdrawn and transferred to retained earnings brought forward. Additionally, at the conclusion of the Sixth Medium-term Management Plan (the fiscal year ended March 2025), employees received a distribution of the Company's shares through the employee stock ownership trust, and retired directors (and other officers) received a distribution of the Company's shares through the board benefit trust.

As a result, treasury shares were ¥2,576 million at the end of the period under review, with an increase of ¥1,101 million due to acquisition, partially offset by decreases of ¥462 million due to the distribution of shares through the employee stock ownership trust and ¥6 million due to the distribution of shares through the board benefit trust. Additionally, the entire amount of the general reserve, ¥7,247 million, was withdrawn and transferred to retained earnings brought forward. This resulted in retained earnings brought forward of ¥19,388 million and a zero balance in the general reserve at the end of the period under review.

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Auditor's Conclusion

We have conducted an interim review of the quarterly non-consolidated financial statements of Mito Securities Co., Ltd. for the third quarter (from October 1, 2025, to December 31, 2025) and the first nine-month period (from April 1, 2025, to December 31, 2025) of the 81st fiscal term from April 1, 2025 to March 31, 2026, included in the "Attached Materials" section of the quarterly earnings report, namely, the quarterly non-consolidated balance sheets, quarterly non-consolidated statements of income, and notes thereto.

Basis for Auditor's Conclusion

Our responsibilities under the interim review standards are described in "Auditor's Responsibilities in the Interim Review of the Quarterly Non-consolidated Financial Statements." Pursuant to the code of professional ethics (including the provisions applicable to the audits of financial statements of public interest entities) in Japan, we are independent of the Company and have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities as an auditor. We believe that we have obtained the evidence to form a basis for our conclusion.

- If we determine that a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the going concern assumption, we will conclude, based on the evidence obtained, whether nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the quarterly non-consolidated financial statements are not prepared in accordance with Article 4, Paragraph 1 of Standards for Preparation of Quarterly Financial Statements of the Tokyo Stock Exchange, Inc. and accounting principles generally accepted in Japan for quarterly financial statements, applying the provisions for reduced disclosures as set forth in Article 4, Paragraph 2 of the Standards. If we determine that a material uncertainty exists related to the going concern assumption, we are required to draw attention in the interim review report to the notes to the quarterly non-consolidated financial statements or, if such notes to the quarterly non-consolidated financial statements regarding material uncertainty are inadequate, to express a qualified or negative conclusion on the quarterly non-consolidated financial statements. Our conclusion is based on the evidence obtained up to the date of the interim review report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Company to cease to continue as a going concern.
- We evaluate whether nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the presentation of and notes to the quarterly non-consolidated financial statements are not prepared in accordance with Article 4, Paragraph 1 of Standards for Preparation of Quarterly Financial Statements of the Tokyo Stock Exchange, Inc. and accounting principles generally accepted in Japan for quarterly financial statements, applying the provisions for reduced disclosures as set forth in Article 4, Paragraph 2 of the Standards.

We report to the Audit and Supervisory Committee on the planned scope and timing of the interim review and significant findings from the interim review.

We report to the Audit and Supervisory Committee on our compliance with the code of professional ethics in Japan regarding independence, matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on the auditor's independence, and where applicable, details of the measures taken to eliminate impediments or safeguards adopted to mitigate impediments to an acceptable level.
